HHC 2011

Each year I look ahead to our "annual" HP Handheld Conference wondering what we will talk about, what we will demonstrate, learn, discover, and who we will meet. I have seen many changes in the HP calculator market place, but recent changes, reflected by the conferences recorded at <u>http://hhuc.us</u>, have been so unexpected that it is increasingly difficult to "project" ahead.

Our Conferences since HHC 2007 have been held at an HP facility and this has provided two especially nice advantages. (1) We save the cost of renting the Conference Meeting room. (2) We are able to focus entirely on the topics at hand because we spend 100% of our extended weekend time all in one place – no facilities changes are needed for breaks or meals.

We use a standard HHC "format" but we place greater emphasis on what is most important for that year. Will HP show a new product, or is there a new third party product, etc. What are the issues that the HP User Community, HPUC, is concerned with, and what can we, as a group, do to advance the HP calculator art?

The accomplishments of the HPUC are many, ranging from suggesting and (eventually) seeing new features or functions as part of an HP calculator, to publishing books or calendars and even to provide new math algorithms for HP to use.

The HHC website, where this is posted, also records the history of the Conferences since HHC 2000 and we now have a single simple site from which you may review any of our past websites. Our webmaster, Joseph K. Horn, has done a superb job of constructing this 11th HHC website. He recently added

Conference photos to the site, and you may review them by clicking on the \overline icon. These photos are annotated so you may, usually, connect a name to a face.

This year I am more confident of a varied Conference because of a significant number of interesting HPUC and HP projects that will be presented. These are being continuously discussed on the HHC list. HP Calculator Refurbishing book. Geoff Quickfall (see lead article in *HP Solve issue #12 at:* <u>http://h20331.www2.hp.com/Hpsub/cache/580500-0-0-225-121.html</u>) gave a presentation at HHC 2010 on this really neat project. This is a must have book for every HP Calculator user.

It has also been made in more countries, five, and for a short period in two countries at one time. The HP-12C is part of the Voyager series and we will be recognizing this achievement.

Calculator Book Event This idea was suggested by an attendee who was asking about Geoff's book project. Another reason that this is suggested is Gene Wright wanting a hard copy of the PPC ROM Manual. He wants to get participants to sign his copy. I suggested to several book authors that they should bring copies of their books to sell. I know that if I can buy a book on the spot I will most likely to buy it because I will forget to order it later. If you have some books to sell – new or used – bring them to the Conference and participate in this "Calculator Book Event." I think that some HP people would also be interested.
